## **Entering the competition**

## **Registration:**

- Registration is via the NPCS Speech and Drama app. The link for this will be released from the week of 5th May 2025 on the NPCS Facebook page and website.
- If you have any trouble using the app, please contact the convenor: corinnedavies@gmail.com.

## Entries and payment:

- Entries are made through the app above, following the registration step.
- No late entries will be accepted after the closing date, 12th June 2025.
- Payment is also made via the app above. Entries are not finalised until payment is made.
- Fees are non-refundable.
- Competitors may only enter once in each class, with the exception of Play Extract classes.

## Programme:

- The programme will be released two weeks before the competition date.
- Printed programmes are not provided. We recommend you use the NPCS Speech and Drama app, or print your own copy of the programme from the PDF supplied in the app.
- Please note that while we try to avoid it, there may be late changes to the programme, so this may adjust the order or timing of sections on the day.

## Rules

# Please read these rules carefully. Breach of these rules may result in disqualification of a competitor from a class or these competitions.

Contact the convenor (corinnedavies@gmail.com) if you have any questions or would like clarification on any of the following points.

### Age limits:

• The competitor's age is to be taken as at 1st June in the year of the competition.

### Competitors:

• All classes are for amateur performers. This means that competitors do not derive substantial income from Speech and Drama or related performances. Prize money does not affect amateur status.

### **Restricted classes:**

• Restricted classes are open to competitors who have not won a first prize placement in a similar class at any similar competition or festival in New Zealand.

### Time limits:

• Time limits are provided for each class in the tables below.

### Chosen pieces and printed copies:

- The following rules apply to all classes **except** Prepared Speech, Sight Reading, Test Poem, Impromptu, Play Extract, Quick Study, and Storytelling.
- A hard copy of each piece (printed or photocopied) must be provided to the convenor on the day, upon arrival to the venue.
- Please label each piece with the competitor's name and class number.
- For Character Sketch and Play Extract classes, a short introduction of up to 100

words shall be provided to the convenor. All Character Sketches and Play Extracts will be introduced by an appointed person, using the introduction supplied.

## Original Poem Classes (14J, 16J, or 21J):

- Compositions must be performed by the author, at the time scheduled. Entries will be adjudicated on quality of composition and performance.
- Competitors must submit a clear copy of their composition to the convenor Corinne Davies (corinnedavies@gmail.com) by 1 July 2025. These will be forwarded to the adjudicator, prior to the start of the competitions.

## Sight Reading, Test Poem, Quick Study, Storytelling, and Improvisation classes:

• Competitors will be asked to leave the room and wait together in a separate space until it is their turn to perform. After their performance they may return to sit in the audience.

### Conduct:

• All competitors, teachers, family and audience members are expected to behave respectfully to others, and especially to current competitors. We ask for the audience to refrain from talking during performances, and to only enter or exit the venue between performances.

## Prompting and interruptions:

- No prompting is allowed, except by the adjudicator or secretary.
- Once the adjudicator has indicated a competitor to start their piece (via a bell), no interruptions from parents, teachers, or audience members are allowed, for any reason.
- Interruptions from the family or teacher of a competitor may result in disqualification of the competitor from the class. Only the adjudicator, secretary, or convenor may interrupt a performance.

### Taking photos and recording videos:

• Taking photos and videos of your own child is permitted, provided it does not interfere with the performance, or visibility for the adjudicator.

### Adjudicators:

- The convenor reserves the right to replace any advertised adjudicator if necessary.
- Any adjudicator may decline to make an award if items are not deemed to be of sufficient merit.
- The decision of the adjudicator shall be final in all classes.
- No competitor, their teacher, family members, or any other interested parties shall communicate with the adjudicator on the subject of the competitor prior to or during the festival. The committee may disqualify a competitor for any breach of this rule.
- No competitor who has been taught or coached by the adjudicator during the last two years will be allowed to compete.
- No close family member of the adjudicator will be allowed to compete.

## Cups, Trophies and Prizes:

- Trophies are the property of NPCS and may be held by the winner for the year up until the next competitions.
- The competitor is responsible for replacement or repair of trophies if damage or loss occurs.
- Engraving is the responsibility of the competitor.
- Please take care of your trophies and return them, cleaned, to the convenor (or via your teacher) the following year, at least one month before the competition date.
- Cash prizes must be signed for before the competitor leaves the venue.

## National Young Performer Awards 2025 Class

Please refer to the PACANZ website for full details of the National Young Performer criteria and competition details: https://www.pacanz.co.nz/

- Competitors must enter and compete in at least two other classes in these competitions.
- Competitors for this class must ordinarily reside in the Taranaki region and may be asked to provide proof of this.
- Competitors must send copies of their extracts to the convenor Corinne Davies (corinnedavies@gmail.com) by 1 July 2025. These will be forwarded to the adjudicator, prior to the start of the competitions.
- In submitting your entry you have agreed to be available to compete at the National Final in Palmerston North on 24-26 October 2025. Please advise us if you are withdrawing from the Nomination Award for any reason.

## Criteria:

A. Competitors shall be 15 and under 21 years as at 1st October 2025.

B. Each competitor shall present a programme of 13 to 15 minutes duration of a contrasting nature, marked out of 80.

- 1. One prepared prose of 3 to 4 minutes duration
- 2. One item of poetry
- 3. One characterisation
- 4. Each competitor shall introduce the programme and provide a linking commentary. This should be in extempore style.
- 5. The use of Props and/or Costumes is optional.

C. Each competitor shall give a two-minute Improvisation during the preliminary round. The adjudicator shall select the topic. Thirty seconds of preparation time will be allowed. The Improvisation shall be marked out of 20 marks.

D. A penalty of five marks will be imposed if the minimum time limit is not met, or the maximum time limit is exceeded by 30 seconds or more.

## **Society Nomination**

Each Society, which is a financial member of PACANZ, may nominate up to two competitors, who shall be selected by the adjudicator, based on a performance as outlined above.

The adjudicator will determine that a competitor has displayed a sufficient standard of performance to competently represent that society at the National Young Performer Awards.

The standard required will be at the absolute discretion of the adjudicator but will include;

- A demonstration of adequate preparation
- An authority of performance
- A performance with a level of maturity commensurate with a national final competition of this age group.

If the adjudicator considers that sufficient standard has not been reached by any competitor, then no nomination will be made.

The Nominating Society is responsible for paying part of the entry fee to the National Young Performer Awards, which is \$75.00 incl gst.

The Nominee is responsible for paying their portion of the entry fee to the National Young Performer Awards, which is \$230.00 incl gst.

## **Direct Nomination**

Via a Competition Society Member: If the adjudicator considers that more than two competitors have reached a sufficient standard, the adjudicator may report to the committee that those competitors should be given the option of a Direct Nomination.

Via a Tertiary Institution Member: Nominations may also be put forward if Speech & Drama students have reached a sufficient standard and can meet the Criteria listed above.

The Direct Nomination competitor will be responsible for paying the full entry fee, which is \$305.00 incl gst.

## Scholarships

All scholarships are awarded for the highest aggregate marks for the classes listed.

Any competitors who have entered all the necessary classes will automatically be entered for these awards.
